

Hillside Land Appeal update

We are delighted to tell you that we have successfully completed the first part of the purchase of our additional land. This ideally-situated land which

neighbours the Sanctuary, consists of twenty acres, with two substantial barns, one measuring 120' x 60' and the other 60' x 40'. There are eleven fenced meadows, most equipped with field shelters providing much needed special-care paddocks for our older horses and ponies There is also a block of twelve stables.

The second stage of the land purchase comprises the larger of the two barns complete with two acres, (pictured above) which will be perfect for our more elderly special-care cows and donkeys. We are hoping to complete this final stage by the end of October when the animals will benefit most at the start of the Winter months. We have a loan arranged on standby to make up any shortfall that we are unable to raise but we are obviously hoping to borrow as little as possible to avoid depleting our funds in the future with interest-added repayments.

As you can imagine, the acquisition of this land for our Sanctuary will now make an enormous difference - not only to the animals presently in our care but also to those who will benefit in the future. All this has been possible thanks to the generousity of you, our supporters, to whom our 'residents' will be eternally grateful.



SUFFERING IN SILENCE

An idyllic picture? You might think so but, by the time you receive this newsletter these lambs will have been callously taken from their mothers and slaughtered. Their body parts will by now, probably be displayed on a meat counter - maybe somewhere near you!

For four years we have monitored sheep on the above field and have twice reported incidents to Trading Standards and at least four to the RSPCA. This year alone we have recorded the following cases of neglect:

- I. A ewe, with two lambs, dragging a severely infected vaginal prolapse.
- **2.** Lambs left staggering around with painful swollen joints due to infection contracted through their navel, 'joint ill'.
- **3**. Pregnant ewes, were left to die in agony while experiencing difficult births without necessary assistance. (see below)



4. Ewes and lambs alike in urgent need of veterinary attention, were left with painful aggressive foot rot. (see our letter to the RSPCA opposite following our report and below, we treat a lamb with severe foot rot while her mother looks on.)



- **5**. One lamb was suffering with foot rot *and* a broken front leg.
- **6**. Many orphaned lambs left to fend for themselves.

- **7.** Lambs straying loose on a busy country road due to inadequate fencing.
- **8**. A terrified mother and lamb drowning in a fast flowing dyke. (below, we pull them to safety)



9. Sheep with serious flystrike over large areas of their bodies heaving with maggots. (see below)



- **I 0**. Young lamb born with a 'shaking affliction' deteriorating day by day.
- 11. Worm-egg counts from sheep faeces confirmed a high parasite burden.
- **12.** Decaying sheep and lambs left for days and weeks in fields and dykes, often until they disintegrated. (see letter opposite)

- **13**. A ewe so noticeably ill who died right in front of us leaving two orphan lambs.
- **I 4.** Main flock of sheep moved from one field to another leaving very young lambs behind without their mother.



This lamb was desperately trying to suckle from her dead mother. Her brother had also perished.



It was too late to save this lamb who we

found soaking wet and bleating for her mother. Sadly, she had died in a dyke at least two days previously.



Our letter to the RSPCA following our last report to them in July 2004:

Dear Sirs,

Thank you for your prompt response to our report regarding severely lame sheep in a field near Norwich. However, we did suggest that for you to assess properly the severity of those with prolonged foot rot, the whole flock would need to be penned and individually examined. Despite the fact that we had seen at least forty badly limping sheep, your inspector, who simply walked amongst them, told me that out of around two hundred and fifty animals, he saw 'only' six that were lame and that he was 'only really concerned about two of them'. He felt that, taking into account the size of the flock, this was an acceptable amount and also that the RSPCA continuously received reports about other lame sheep in Norfolk. Your inspector also suggested that the sheep in question may just have had stones wedged in their feet. I know this wasn't generally the cause as we managed to catch and treat four sheep on site, whose foot rot had been so severely neglected, that some had lost hooves, leaving the animals hobbling with bleeding, maggot-infested stumps. We are sure that if a horse or a donkey had been found in this appalling condition due to lack of veterinary attention, a prosecution would almost certainly have ensued.

This recent report is the fourth time during the last three years that we have informed you about sheep on this particular field, and despite your talking to the owner or leaving him a note, as you did on this last occasion, the care of these animals never seems to improve. Despite also reporting to Trading Standards this farmer's usual practice of leaving sheep to decay for weeks in fields and ditches, we are still coming across decomposing carcasses!

I know that unfortunately your inspectors are already fully stretched in their work and that the problem of the immense suffering endured by farmed animals is much bigger than both our organisations can deal with. However, if only more cases were properly brought to justice this would send out a strong message to the thousands of other offending farmers. We have proved time and time again that reporting such cases to DEFRA or Trading Standards is mostly a waste of time as they so rarely prosecute. Although reluctant to take any follow-up action, Trading Standards will at least visit soon after they receive a report, whereas DEFRA seem to ignore any such request or wait months before making an investigation!

You have told us that in your experience, courts view suffering caused to animals reared for food as a much lesser offence than cruelty inflicted on their domestic counterparts, and that only around fifteen per cent of your convictions involve farm animals. This is surprising, due to the fact that millions more farm animals are suffering compared to domestic pets. But it is not surprising bearing in mind that food animals are conveniently reared behind closed doors out of the public's gaze. You have in the past criticised us for advocating a meat-free diet, but we do feel that by promoting animal-friendly food, while showing the public how the animals they eat continue to suffer with little intervention from the authorities, is the most positive way forward. Owing to the aforementioned lack of action taken, ultimately it is only the public themselves who can make the difference!


Finally, you have often written to our supporters, "it is easy to forget that the RSPCA has no special entitlement to bring prosecutions. Anyone at all with enough evidence can initiate a prosecution. As far as I am aware, Hillside have never chosen to prosecute anyone despite their on-going criticism of the Society for this apparent failure." We consider this unfair as although at Hillside our strength is in exposing hidden cases of farm animal abuse, it is your Society with over a 100 years' experience and a well set up legal department, that has the expertise to bring these animal abusers to justice.

We await your response with interest.

FREEDOM FOOD DUCKS' DAY O

You may remember receiving our postcard (shown top left) in March 2003, givinto the horrendous conditions of ducks being reared on RSPCA 'monitored' Free This investigation began on Christmas Day 2002 and continued until 13th February 2003 farm. This was actually the FOURTH time that we have brought this duck producer to began filming this same suffering three years ago, it was not until December 2002 that we were actually being reared under the Freedom Food flag.

We filmed shed after shed where literally THOUSANDS of ducks existed. The stench of ammonia enveloped hundreds of crippled, blind, injured and dying birds as to days in the hope that they would draw breath long enough to make it to the slaughter literally agreed to inspect one offending farm. However, inspectors are obliged to insupply owned by the RSPCA) of any complaint made against a FF approved site and, within the farm's location, a clean-up operation had been organised - the first we had witness

Our response to this was to advise the RSPCA that their planned inspective their raid was aborted. However, just one week later we found the ever! On receiving this new evidence, the RSPCA agreed to raid again attempt that resulted in around 300 ducks being culled (we filmed the outside), the RSPCA still found a number of suffering and dying ducks on site. Dear Hillside

Upon watching the video of ducks on a Freedom Food a there appears to be very many serious welfare considerations. Ma are deformed – especially leg deformities leading to lameness, a seem able to walk at all – using their wings as crutches which will e wing damage too. Other leg lesions and swellings in the limbs are

One duck is seen dragging a paralysed leg, which seems possibly fractured. Other plumage and eye lesions are also visible ducks also exhibit signs of nervous system problems: poor balanthemselves from dorsal recumbancy, apparent blindness.

As for the housing there is some loose rope mesh in wh seen entangled, unable to free itself.

Dead bodies are seen everywhere, also in the water troug an advanced stage of decomposition. The filming was carried o successive evenings and it is obvious that the dead bodies have not This poses a serious health risk (especially the body in the water).

On 24th August 2004 Kerry Foods were found NOT GUILTY of causing unnecessary suffering, pain and distress to ducks!

Despite providing the RSPCA with footage taken on several different days over a period of six weeks, it was only the evidence gathered on the day of their raid, 13th February 2003, that was used in court. We felt the RSPCA presented a very weak case and some of their prosecution tactics were questionable:

- 1. The vet acting for the RSPCA during the inspection when they found dozens of dead and dying ducks, stated that he didn't carry out post-mortems on the decomposing birds as some had been dead for up to 24 hours and developing bacteria would confuse the results. In view of the fact that Kerrys were adamant that their 'experienced' staff carried out thorough inspections, how was it that decaying birds had been left, in the vet's opionion, lying in the sheds for 24 hours, and why wasn't this questioned by the prosecution's barrister?
- 2. Why was the judge shown the RSPCA's footage of Kerry's ducks at Wood Lane Corner, Little Ellingham in Norfolk which was filmed AFTER culling had taken place and therefore bore no resemblence to the scale of the suffering there beforehand?
- 3. Despite our investigator being asked by the RSPCA to attend and be prepared to give evidence, he was not asked to take the stand at all.
- 4. Neither the additional footage which we were asked to bring along or our evidence already in the RSPCA's possession was not shown or even referred to.
- 5. On day one of the two-day hearing the RSPCA issued a press release which was broadcast by the BBC, saying that this incident was an isolated one as Kerrys had a good welfare record. This was in spite of the copious evidence we had provided them with over the years, so much so that they eventually felt obliged to bring about a prosecution.
- 6. The fact that the farm had an accreditation under the RSPCA's Freedom Food scheme was not mentioned in court and was therefore omitted from all media reports.

It was admitted in court that the birds had been suffering from septicaemia and the whole case was based around the fact that Kerrys claimed the duck shed lights are switched off at 9pm so there wasn't time to perform a third routine inspection without disturbing the birds. The RSPCA and their vet said this check should have been carried out in order to avoid sick ducks lingering on for extra unnecessary hours. In court Mr Richard Charley, for Kerrys, told, under oath, that lights on all the 30 farms he managed, are turned off at 9pm until 3am the following day to allow the ducks sufficient time to rest, therefore not allowing time for a third daily inspection before 9pm. Despite this testimony we have filmed evidence to show that it is common practice for the lights to be left on until I I pm, and even during a recent joint investigation with the BBC* when we visited Kerry sites on three different occasions, the sheds were still illuminated between 10pm and 11pm. Even the RSPCA vet stated in court that he had written in his notes (probably from somebody's information at the time of the raid) that the lights in the duck sheds went out at 11pm. We are providing the RSPCA, as the prosecuting body, with this evidence and await their action.

Despite all their legal wrangling over extra checks and lights-out times, the fact still remains that if Kerry's staff had thoroughly inspected the birds during their normal twice-daily checks and culled the ailing birds as they had claimed, we would not have been able to film the hundreds of ducks left in a state of prolonged suffering in the evenings just a few hours after their last 'inspection'! Our footage consistently shows dying birds left to suffer for days and we filmed the farm's own records which clearly showed that on alternate weekends the birds were not checked at all! Kerry also admitted that they had not consulted their veterinary practice about the outbreak of disease which appears to be endemic on their farms.


The ducks referred to in court were the second flock of birds that we had filmed at the Wood Lane Corner site between Christmas Day 2002 and 11th February 2003. After the RSPCA's raid when post-mortems confirmed that these birds had septicaemia, we followed the lorry taking those not culled to Kerry's slaughterhouse near Diss for entry into the human food chain. The first flock we filmed displaying similar worrying symptoms had also been taken for slaughter and although not thought to pose a health threat to the public, some consumers must almost certainly be eating birds that have been harbouring or incubating septicaemia - commonly known as blood poisoning. Ducks suffering from septicaemia face a slow death over a period of up to 48 hours. Septicaemia is often contracted as a direct result of being kept in stressful, unnatural conditions. Anyone who has watched our general investigation video, 'Factory Farming Today', will have seen footage, taken back in 2000, of Kerry Food ducks on another farm exhibiting similar symptoms to those we filmed suffering from septicaemia in this 2003 investigation.

District Judge Jennifer Edwards concluded "I think there can be no doubt that this company did have the birds' welfare in their minds." Maybe if Judge Edwards had been presented with all the facts she might have 'thought' differently!

This will be shown on the investigation programme 'Inside Out' which is due to be broadcast this September.
